## EDITORIAL

According to Secretary Laird, the sole authority for President Nixon's decision for increased action in Vietnam is the protection of American troops during withdrawal. However it would seem that the best protection of American troops would be to bring them all home, not to increase their involvement in the fighting.

So it seems Nixon has some other commitment in South Vietnam than the protection of American troops. This commitment seems to be to maintain the government of South Vietnam, based on the principle of self-determination for the people of South Vietnam. American involvement and aid has been seen as necessary to balance Chinese and Russian aid to the North. However it is interesting that figures released by Secretary Rogers have shown that the U.S. is giving ten times more aid than China and Russia together. This overbalance of aid for the regime of South Vietnam should guarantee victory. But this has not been the case. N. Vietnam has not been weakened and has even had the strength to launch an offensive, an offensive which S. Vietnam has needed massive U.S. aid to halt. The question can then be honestly raised as to how "self-determined" the regime of South Vietnam is. It would then seem that Nixon's commitment to this regime is not based on the principle of self-determination but on the desire to preserve an anti-Communist government in spite of self-determination.

American interests are not being served in Vietnam and American lives are being risked, not protected. The continuous destruction of Vietnamese lives and resources can not be morally or practically defended. American withdrawal should be immediate and total.

## MCSA CONSTITUTION RATIFICATION

On Wednesday, April 19, the student body in general were given the opportunity to ratify the MCSA Constitution. The results are as follows:

Approval	173
Disapproval	17
Total Voting	190

The two-thirds majority of those voting which is needed for ratification was clearly obtained. The percentage of students voting is commendable in comparison with previous elections, polls, and referendums. However it should be realized by the non-voting population of Marian College that even though one may feel separated from the issue, in reality he is not. The Financial Responsibility Plan which is part of the Constitution established guidelines for next year's budgeting process. Through this process it will be determined whether Marian students can continue to attend Theater Productions without additional costs. Any student funds, whether it be for publications, clubs, or class allocations, will be obtained through the plan established within the Constitution. The Student Board being the executive body of the Marian College Student Association has the power to "receive student complaints, investigate student problems and participate (next column)

in decisions affecting students." This statement in itself clearly illustrates why passivity is not acceptable.

This is in reference to the "educational mission" rationale behind the prohibition on the use of alcoholic beverages. We believe that students over the age of 21, as responsible adults and legal citizens, have the ability to make their own decisions regarding the use of alcoholic beverages when away from campus. Therefore, we request an exemption to the College off-campus prohibition of alcoholic beverages.
