

Pianist Richard Collins to appear Sunday, Feb. 26

Richard Collins will present an unusual program of piano music at Marian College, on Sunday, Feb. 26, at 3 p.m. His program will feature the four Ballades and 24 Preludes of Chopin.

Richard Collins studied at The Juilliard School in New York City, and he received his doctorate in performance from the University of Michigan. He was also the winner of a Fulbright Grant for piano study with Pietro Scarpini in Florence, Italy.

He has performed extensively in Europe, and has appeared in recital on radio and television in this country. He currently is artist-in-residence at Brenac College, in Gainesville, Georgia.

This year Collins has chosen a unique way to return to the concert stage. From October to April he is touring the entire country, playing recitals in more than 70 colleges and universities, large and small, representing 34 states.

Admission is \$2 for adults, \$1 for students. Marian College students with I.D. will be admitted free.

Marian College Trustees elect two new members

Two new members have been elected to the Marian College Board of Trustees, as announced by President Louis C. Gatto.

Thomas M. Miller, president of The Indiana National Bank, and K. Clay Smith, president of Underwood Machinery Transport, Inc., have been added to the 26-member board at Marian.

A Corydon (Ind.) native, Miller was graduated from the Indiana University School of Business and the Graduate School of Banking at the University of Wisconsin. He joined INB in 1954, was elected vice president in 1963, senior vice president in 1968 and executive vice president in 1971. He became president and chief operating officer of INB in 1976.

Smith is a graduate of the University of Notre Dame and the Georgetown University School of Law. The U.S. Air Force veteran previously served as a special agent for the FBI. He also is an attorney at law of counsel with the firm of Kightlinger, Young, Gray and DeTrude.

Charter class of nurses completes unique program

Products of a unique program underway at Marian College, 30 new registered nurses will soon be serving in Central Indiana medical facilities.

A colorful candlelight pinning ceremony, held before Christmas in the school chapel, marked the completion of studies for the pioneer group of nursing students.

The students ranged in age from 21 to 47, with an average of nearly 10 years of experience as licensed practical nurses in hospitals and other health-care facilities.

Known as a "career-ladder" nursing program, Marian officials laid the groundwork over a three-year period to establish a tri-semester, 48-week course of clinical and academic studies for the experienced, licensed practical nurse.

The program, the only one of its kind in the country, recognizes the licensed nurse's experience with 16 hours of college credit. Upon completion of the program the nurses are not only qualified for their State Board Exam for Registered Nursing, given February 1, but they also receive an associate degree in nursing from Marian.

Mary Ann Lewis, R.N., M.A., is director of the Marian's nursing program, the first of its kind approved by the State Nursing Board.

A second class of 44 candidates has begun their studies at Marian this semester, to be finished by December.

Enrollment stats

Preliminary enrollment figures for the second semester show a loss of 38 students. Student enrollment went up in both the freshman and junior classes. The sophomore and senior classes both showed a slight decrease from September figures.

The drop in the sophomore class can be credited to the loss of 30 nurses on the Associate degree program. More than 40 ADN nursing candidates are counted as freshmen. There is a decrease of 20 in the number of evening students.

The largest numbers of withdrawals are in the freshman and sophomore classes, with a drop of 23 and 21, respectively. Some students in those groups were reclassified one class higher.

December grads

Approximately 36 Marian students completed the requirements for graduation after the past semester. Thirty of these students finished the ADN nursing program. Winter blizzard forces loss of class days

Disaster! That is the word that would describe the weather that started Wednesday, Jan. 25 and continued until Friday, Jan. 27.

Over a foot of snow was dropped on the area of Indianapolis and throughout the state. Along with all this snow were winds that gusted up to 50 m.p.h. With all the snow and wind, drifting occurred throughout the blizzard as high as five and six feet.

The drifting of the snow made driving conditions almost impossible. Most of the main roads in the city were closed completely. As a result of this, many travellers were stranded on the highways until help came. There were seven deaths recorded in Indianapolis. Road crews could not even work in improving the conditions because of the large amount of snow and continuous wind.

The city was at a complete standstill. People were not able to go to work as well as even getting out of their houses. Grocery stores were empty as the customers stocked up for the blizzard. Trucks were not moving while even the mail didn't go through.

The Marian campus was as isolated as the rest of the state. Classes were cancelled for three consecutive days—Jan. 26, 27 and 30. Students and faculty living on campus began to navigate by Saturday and Sunday, Jan. 28 and 29.

Although the blizzard had subsided by the week-end, Monday's classes were cancelled because campus roads and parking lots were not cleared for parking by day students.

Several suggestions have been made by faculty and students about makeup possibilities including:

- Cut spring vacation shorter
- Transfer Field Day from a Wednesday to a Saturday
- Extend the semester by one week
- Schedule several Saturdays for missed classes

According to Sister Margaretta Black, academic dean, "the best method seems to be a wise use of all the class hours available, some revision of planned activities, some independent study or research on the part of students."

Varsity cagers gain valuable experience

Coach John Grimes' varsity cagers are gaining valuable experience this season. Although the team has suffered some tough losses, it has posted four victories.

This is Coach Grimes' first opportunity to use the players that he recruited. This has created a very youthful squad with freshmen dominating. These young players are showing hustle and determination, but have been hampered by inexperience that can only be smoothed out with playing time.

Top players to watch are Ron Brothers, Jim Brothers, Bob Wood, Phil Sarvari and Jim Dossman.

Ron Brothers, a 6-7 freshman from North Putnam H.S., is the Knights' most aggressive rebounder. He has pulled down 102 caroms, 42 of these off the offensive boards.

Sarvari, a 6-3 freshman product of South Bend St. Joseph's, is leading a balanced scoring attack with 9.8 points per game. Dossman, 6-3 senior from Indianapolis Brebeuf, has dealt out 42 assists.

Newly-eligible during the second semester are transfer students Jim Brothers, Brendan McGeehan and Mark Bateman. Lost to grades was leading scorer Kevin Smith.

Other players to watch include freshmen Chad Miller and Dale Wernke. With scrapping players like these, the Knights will be exciting for the next few years.
