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TO THE MASSES:

I would like to share with the masses the opinion of a few of us reached and let you be the judge. This past weekend we witnessed a typical Marian College dictorial form of justice. Several students were rounded up and led to the R.D.'s office in Doyle. Once there the students were told that due to some thefts they were going to search the rooms for the master keys. The students were then locked in the room while their tyrant leaders rushed off to look for master keys. The meeting was called to order by Alice Mattingly at 9:05. The minutes were read and approved.  
Treasury report: The balance is \$6,819.41.  
Student Affairs: None.  
Academic Affairs: They had a meeting and discussed:  
1) Recommendation of revising divisional patterns.  
2) Proposed cooperative agreement on Ivy Tech. Accounting Majors transferring to Marian.  
3) Fort Benjamin Harrison class schedule for the fall, 1978.  
4) Request to change PS 275 Physiological Psychology from 4 hrs. to 3 hrs and discontinue the laboratory fee.  
5) Update report on Project 45 Marian's involvement in a government program designed to have 25 students become involved with a nursing home. The students will be paid \$3.00 per hour for four hrs. of work per week. These hours will be 10:00 till 2:00 one day each week. Indiana Central, Butler, Franklin, and I.U.P.U.I. will also be participating under the same requirements.

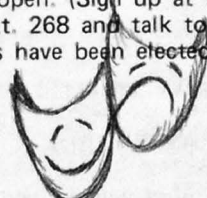

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E.L.S. sends S.O.S.

As a teacher at English Language Services, I have many opportunities to observe the campus scene. It has become very clear that there are some basic misunderstandings which have developed between the E.L.S. students and Marian College students. Both groups have some wrong ideas about each other and there have been problems caused by both ELS and Marian students. Much of this is largely due to a lack of understanding of each other's cultural background and expectations. Each is different from the other. Also, there is the mistaken idea that ALL ELS students are wealthy people. Such a generality just is not true, in the same way that ALL Americans are not wealthy! (Many of the foreign students come to the U.S. with that mistaken notion). Most students are here on scholarship from their governments, OR they have worked hard and long to save enough money to study here. Many American students know what that involves. (Summer jobs are easier to get here in the U.S. than in most other countries).

There are many factors involved in our relationships. As Americans, we do not want to project a bad image to other people. As foreigners, the ELS students don't want to project a bad image either.

There are ways to do something about this...to help each of us to learn of the needs and expectations each person has. (We may not be so far apart, in reality.) New English speakers need practice to make their English their own. They need to talk with native English speakers... Americans. When American students go abroad to study, many practice opportunities are patiently and generously given by the native speakers of that language. Why can't we do the same?

If any of you are genuinely interested in trying to do something about improving understanding and relationships, Sister Sue Bradshaw and I would like to suggest a project.

Many of our ELS students would be grateful to have some regular opportunity for conversation with an American student. If any of you would be willing to give one or two hours a week to have conversation with an ELS student, please contact Sister Sue Bradshaw in the Campus Ministry Office, ext. 560, or call the ELS office (923-2371) with your name and the times you would be willing and able to give.

It would be a great beginning for some new international understanding.
