Two opposing groups of thought have evolved from the much heated controversy over the appropriation of money by the Student Board for the purpose of transporting a number of Marian students to and from Montgomery. Neither group has been the victor nor the loser.

How has Marian benefited by the past two weeks of contention? This issue has helped to lessen the "I could care less attitude" of most of the student body. This passive attitude was well expressed earlier this year when the board called a required assembly to inform the students of its accomplishments.

However, we must remember that financial and moral issues have to be considered separately. Financially, we have two directly opposite views: that the student board was totally within its rights in appropriating money; or that the board should have considered and weighed the opinions of the majority of the students before acting.

Morally, there can be no opinion but the right one. That we as Christians have an obligation to see to it that there is no inequality among races, particularly in our own nation.

But we do have the right, and we are thoroughly justified in choosing our own means to this end. Whether it be a private prayer or a public expression, we are still fulfilling our own duty towards our brother. We may not be able to comprehend the views that another person holds. We may brand his way of expression as ridiculous and antagonistic. But we must still have the same goal in mind--equality. There is no room for prejudice at Marian College.

To the editor:

On Monday, March 22, an "emergency" meeting of the Student Board was called. At this council of student opinion a measure was passed to allocate \$100 of student funds to send individuals to Alabama to represent the student body of Marian College. Is it their right to represent the moral beliefs of the individual students? We think not.

The meeting was called without sufficient notice to the members of the board. Two members of the board were not even notified of this meeting. One of these represents the largest faction of student opinion in the school. Because of this "quick" action by the President of the board, the individual representatives were not allowed enough time to consult with their constituents on their feelings toward this matter.

Do these individuals have the right to represent the opinion of the student body at large without knowing what student opinion is? If they have not polled the students on this matter, then it is our opinion that they should only represent themselves and not the entire student body.

It seems that certain members of the administration have gotten behind the Student Board to push this proposal. Why don't these administrators go themselves or pay the money out of administration funds to send these six people as representatives of these administrators--not as representatives of Marian College.

The question in this matter is not whether a person agrees or disagrees about what is going on in the South. The question is whether the Student Board had the right to allocate \$100 of student funds--which are to be used for matters pertaining to the school--for something which has nothing to do with the school as such. If the feeling was so strong among the students, as the Board vote seemed to indicate, then why weren't plans made for contributions to be made to send these people? The money could certainly have been raised in this manner if the students were so strongly in favor of the proposal...Or were the students in favor of this?

I was shocked to learn that the student board, in a matter of minutes, ram-rodded through a proposal that gave \$100 to a few students for the purpose of representing Marian College in the Selma March. This emergency meeting was called for the sole purpose of financing these students at our expense. I was further horrified by the fact that not all the members of the board were notified of this meeting. Finally, I was informed that one board member had voted for the proposal because the majority present were for it, and not because he thought the money necessary for the prestige of Marian College.

I have not been able to find the drastic emergency that necessitated a meeting upon such short notice. If all the members had been present, and no individuality forfeited, I feel sure that Joe Richter would not have been alone in his vote of "no."

The Student Board is normally quite conservative when it comes to money spending proposals. There is usually considerable debate with the pros and cons. Student opinion is sought by the board, in order that the board may better express the wishes of the majority of the students, whom they represent. Was student opinion viewed by the board for this appropriation? Not even the board members had time to formulate an opinion.

Always the question in these financial proposals is whether Marian College needs the effects that will result. What is gained by hordes of outsiders adding to the confusion and disorder in Alabama? How will Marian benefit by sending these students to participate in the Alabama demonstrations?

If Marian wants to demonstrate and show everyone that the future leaders of America will not tolerate inequality and injustice, why not have a sympathy march or some other form of expression that will have a two-fold effect? Thus, this demonstration will help the American Negro morally, and it will also let the American public know that there is a Marian College in Indianapolis.

I hope and pray, along with the rest of the student body, that the actions of the Student Board will not be regretted with a loss of a life or permanent injury to one of our fellow students.
